When we arrived at Rutgers, we reported directly to the Field House where we were given name cards and instructions to report to the Gymnasium for the General Session. This session was from 9:30 until 11:00. During this time we were addressed by Mr. Van Pool, Assistant Secretary for Student Activities; saw the presentation of the Yearbook to Dr. Elicker, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The candidates were also introduced at the session.

During the lunch hour a social gathering was held. A school orchestra provided music for dancing and there were many exhibits provided by the schools attending the conference. A business meeting was held during the lunch hour also. John Intravartolo attended this meeting. It was here that the new candidates were chosen for their respective offices.
