This session was from 9:30 until 11:00. During this time we were addressed by Mr. Van Pool, Assistant Secretary for Student Activities; saw the presentation of the Yearbook to Dr. Elicker, Executive Secretary of the National Association of Secondary School Principals. The candidates were also introduced at the session.
